A Lot Less Gas

A recent article in the bulletin from the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center featured an article about a project that OARDC is working on in cooperation with scientists in Australia. This project is working on decreasing the amount of greenhouse gasses in the atmosphere. One of these gasses is methane.

The third biggest overall source of methane in the United States and the biggest source that comes from human related activities is the methane that is emitted from livestock - cattle, sheep and more. These animals depend upon microbes in their digestive system to help them digest their food. The methane is a by-product of this digestive process.

Scientists have discovered that the Tammar wallaby in Australia emits very little methane, about 80 % less methane gas per unit of digestive energy intake than a cow does. The scientists have discovered that the much lower gas output in the wallaby is caused by a specific bacterium in its digestive system. The scientists at OARDC hope to use this information to improve the nutrient retention in livestock and thereby lessening the amount of methane the animal produces.

Another article in the same bulletin talks about wine production in Ohio. Wine and grape research at OARDC is helping to boost wine production in Ohio.

The Ohio Department of Agriculture reports that the number of wineries in the state has nearly doubled since 1997, from 75 to 148. Grape growing and wine making together provide more than 4,000 full time jobs and a 580 million dollar boon to Ohio's economy.

OARDC does research on growing different varieties of grapes and making different types of wine.
